Neighborhood Grants Program

Introduction

The Pinal County Town Hall Neighborhood Grants Program is intended to serve as an encouragement and a model. It is an encouragement for citizens to petition their local governments for a neighborhood grants program. It is one model. Many models are available from Arizona cities and around the country.

The number of grants available for this program will be determined by the Pinal County Town Hall Advisory Committee at its June meeting. That number will be based on funding available to the committee for this purpose.

The following paragraphs describe this program. Please read them carefully. Applications that do not conform to these guidelines will not receive consideration. If you have questions, please call Bennett Curry at 520 560-2917.

Program Purpose

The purpose of these grants is to empower neighborhood leaders to organize and implement a specific activity that will enhance conservation and sustainability within their neighborhood. Grants are intended to spur small grassroots community efforts through resident involvement.

Grant Amount

This endeavor is limited to funding available (as stated above). It is hoped up to five grants might be awarded ranging from \$500 - \$1,000.00.

Basic Eligibility

To be eligible the following guidelines must be met:

- A neighborhood within the confines of Pinal County;
- Appointment of a neighborhood leader to lead the activity;

- Hold a minimum of four neighborhood meetings within twelve months and one neighborhood meeting to celebrate success;
- Set a project goal that can be accomplished in twelve months or less;
- Meet a minimum of 250 hours of resident involvement. This can include the neighborhood meetings; sweat equity during neighborhood project, community events, writing/distributing publicity about the project;
- Commit to accurate and complete record keeping for final reporting on the project.

Project Categories

Educational Programs (water conservation, green architecture; home maintenance, zeroscaping, recycling and so on).

Neighborhood Enhancements (projects to increase the aesthetic quality and sustainability of neighborhoods) Most such projects are subject to HOA regulations, federal, state and local laws. The Pinal County Town Hall Advisory Committee is not responsible for any abdication of governing rules, regulations and laws. Some such projects are:

- Neighborhood block clean-ups
- Neighborhood recycling
- Awards for zeroscaping
- Community garden
- Bicycle paths, walking trails
- Fuel conservation
- Streetscape improvements
- Car pooling
- Traffic calming enhancements.

Applications for improvement on private property will be considered with involvement of a minimum of four homes, owner occupied. As stated above, all applicable guidelines and regulations must be followed.

Selection Process

Each application will be evaluated on how well it demonstrates the program's purpose of improving conservation and sustainability by addressing a specific need or concern. The review committee will use a point system to rate each qualifying application. Each applicant will receive a report concerning the evaluation of its request.

Project Completion

A project completion report, along with pictures documenting the activity is required within one-month completion.

Payment

To obtain payment for work completed, an invoice with an attached letter from the project leader stating that the project has been completed, to satisfaction, must be submitted. Requests for reimbursement for up to 50% of the total award can be submitted as the project proceeds. The remaining 50% will only be distributed after the Final Report is received and approved.
