

APRIL 26-28 1995**

INTRODUCTION

One hundred thirty-four delegates participated in the Eighth Annual Pinal County Town Hall held April 26-28, 1995, at the Francisco Grande Resort. This year's theme was **"Pinal Tomorrow: Building Healthier Communities."** Delegates heard from a variety of speakers and panelists, received and reviewed resource materials and participated in one of six discussion groups on this topic.

In order to share, review, and evaluate input from the small discussion groups and to arrive at a collective consensus regarding the topic and related issues, a consensus group met following the final small discussion group session. The consensus group consisted of 14 members which included the co-facilitators and the facilitators and recorders from each small discussion group. The consensus group membership is listed at the conclusion of this report. The process used by the consensus group in arriving at its conclusions was to review and evaluate the input from each of the discussion groups and to identify common areas of agreement and/or disagreement, key concerns, and important issues needing further attention and/or resolution. The consensus group was encouraged to identify recommendations, priorities and initial actions steps which were to include attention to the "who, what, how and when" questions to assure post-Town Hall action, follow-up and ultimate evaluation of progress.

The consensus group report was presented to the delegates assembled at the concluding general session of the Town Hall. **Delegates were urged to sign up for one of the six priorities and participate in potential follow-up efforts. Delegates also indicated in writing their personal commitment for the next twelve months that will help benefit their community. Each delegates personal commitment form is enclosed with this report for their individual follow-up. The name of delegate volunteers are listed with each of the six key priorities. Additional delegate and non-delegate volunteers can be added to any of the six priorities by contacting the chairman of the priority group or identified contact person.**

CONSENSUS GROUP REPORT

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS the delegates to the Eighth Annual Pinal County Town Hall convened, discussed, and deliberated upon the topic of "Pinal Tomorrow: Building Healthier Communities."

AND WHEREAS, those assembled delegates underscored the importance of maintaining and building healthier communities for the adults and youth of today and tomorrow.

AND WHEREAS, those assembled delegates identified common elements that make for healthier communities, as well as assets and barriers that impact this effort.

AND WHEREAS, the delegates assembled, demonstrated supporting efforts to maintain and build healthier communities through voluntary collective efforts and personal commitment.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED

that the delegates assembled adopt the following recommendations and priorities.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Develop working sub groups in areas of interest of each of the six key priorities for building healthier communities.
2. Establish an overall working group with the identified goal of clarifying community values. Furthermore, that the subject of community values be considered by the Town Hall Advisory Committee as a potential topic for the 1996 Town Hall.
3. Promote local town halls focusing on "healthy communities" to define local versions of community health.
4. Develop and expand the working group on intra-county communication in order to celebrate successes and share information resources.

5. Broaden the base of delegate participation in the annual Pinal County Town Hall. Consideration be given to increased number of scholarships, sponsorship by businesses and civic groups, and additional media exposure.
6. Support for the follow-up efforts on the recommendations and key priorities by individual delegates through pledging personal commitment to:
 - a. Volunteer to serve on one of the working sub-groups.
 - b. Accept responsibility for one action step you will personally take that will benefit your community in the next twelve months.

Vision of Education for Pinal County for year 2000

A fully integrated educational system that satisfies the personal needs of individuals, the dedicated social needs of the community, and the changing economic needs of the workplace.

GOALS

1. Every child in Pinal County regardless of age or grade will come to school ready to learn.
2. The high school graduation rate will increase to at least 90 percent.
3. Pinal County students will leave grades four, eight, and twelve having demonstrated competency in challenging subject matter including English, mathematics, science, history, and geography: and every school in Pinal County will ensure that all students learn to use their minds well, so they may be prepared for responsible citizenship, further learning, and productive employment in our modern economy.
4. Pinal County students will achieve at or above the national level in science and mathematics.
5. Every adult in Pinal County will be literate and will possess the knowledge and skills necessary to compete in a global economy and exercise the rights and responsibilities of citizenship.
6. Every school in Pinal County will be free of drugs and violence and will offer a disciplined environment conducive to learning.
7. Every high school will provide school to work transition programs as a goal for non-college bound youth.
8. Schools and colleges will compile, coordinate and disseminate information for the public to "celebrate successes".
9. Pinal County students will leave high school with a common framework of values that will have instilled in them a developing appreciation and understanding of their citizenship responsibilities, including respect and tolerance for their fellow human beings.
